Lester Banks Testified Before the General Assembly, September 5, 1956

Announcer: During the afternoon session a number of negro leaders spoke in opposition to all

plans, among them Lester Banks, representing the state branch of the NAACP.

Lester Banks: The minds of many Americans having been conditioned to the theory that racial

segregation was legal and did not violate the constitution have either supported

opposition to the ruling of the Supreme Court in the school segregation cases or

have given some sympathy to this opposition. However after two years it is now

clear to all concerned that in nine of the southern states and in the District of

Columbia, it has been demonstrated that desegregation can be started and

completed within a reasonable time. Representing the membership of the Virginia

State Conference of branches of the National Association for the Advancement of

Colored People, may it please the committee we oppose all plans having for their

purpose obstruction to the decision of the Supreme Court of the United States

requiring that public schools become desegregated with all deliberate speed.

Announcer: After Banks and several others spoke in opposition to all programs so far

proposed Senator E. O. McCue of Charlottesville took the roster.
